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Subject: Academic Affairs First Monday Update for March, 2022
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Greetings: It's difficult to comprehend all that has happened in Ukraine in just the past two weeks and the near- and long-term impacts this will have across Europe and more globally. One way we can respond to this crisis is to continue to educate our students to be well-informed and engaged global citizens. The Fulton School of Liberal Arts will be hosting a panel and discussion on Global Significance of the Russian Invasion of Ukraine on Tuesday, March 8th at 7 p.m. (see email from the FSLA on 3/4/22). At 4 p.m. on March 11, the Women's Forum will host an event (open to the entire campus community) in honor of International Women's Day and Women's History Month. The theme is "Keeping Hope Alive" and the event will include a reflection for people of Ukraine, a compilation video of stories from SU faculty, staff, and students who identify as female on coping with the past year, and an open discussion (look for an invite on the morning of 3/11/22 which will include the Zoom link and passcode).

Enrollment: Just a quick THANK YOU! to all who supported Scholars Day and Admitted Students Day this weekend and who contribute to recruitment efforts more broadly (including for our graduate and satellite programs). We've got a big hill to climb (half of our current undergraduate students are juniors and seniors) and your commitment to student recruitment and retention is critical.

Required Training: My thanks to all of you who have completed annual training on Cybersecurity and FERPA (both in KnowBe4 in the Employee Links box in Gullnet) and Diversity (required of all employees when hired, see Diversity Training in External Links box in Gullnet). If you haven't completed these training modules, please take time to do so. Each of these areas is required and important (can't overstate the importance of Cybersecurity training and best practices given the current global conflict).

Good news to share:

- SU was again named Top Producer of Fulbright Students by the U.S. Department of State for a fifth consecutive year. And well among many of our peer institutions, we were also designated Top Producer of Fulbright students in the Department of Early & Elementary Education and the country to win both designations in the same year. Congratulations to student applicants and winners, Kristen Walton and the SNCF faculty advisors and mentors, and Brian Polkinghorn and others who serve as liaisons for the Fulbright Scholars program.
